PARCC Presentation by Mrs. Tierney:

The PARCC test is for 3rd through 11th grade in NJ. We use the data to develop teacher training and improve instruction. It is just a snapshot, or a moment in time. Other factors, such as fatigue, confidence, health issues, can impact the results. The test is one of a number of ways to measure learning.

Franklin performs exceedingly well and consistently outperforms the state and district. Comparing year over year, there was growth in all areas except there was a 1 point drop in math from fourth to fifth grade, which may have been a function of a shift (decrease) in the number of students in the classes. Information is pulled out of the individual reports to determine strengths and areas to improve.

Areas of focus for reading/writing are reading informative text and vocabulary, and for math it is numbers & operations (fractions) and modeling & reasoning.

Jacki Aturi and Tanya Lopez (Instructional Coaches):

The new workshop model helps focus on the process not the product. It is learning by doing. The workshop model meets individual needs as opposed to a teacher in the front of the room addressing a class as a whole.

In reading/writing it starts with a mini lesson, then practice and finally share and reflect. The key questions are "What am I noticing" and "what is the big learning." In math, it starts with a warm up; hands on mini lesson, learning solutions then reflect and share.

How do we differentiate learning needs with this model? A number of ways are implemented, one on one, small groups, problem solving between kids and mini lessons.

It is important to build independence. This can be accomplished by building stamina, a growth mindset and trying not to steal the struggle.

There are at home suggestions. For math- positive attitude about math, problem solving in real life, play games, read math books and math in the kitchen. For reading/writing-read a lot in different ways, a lot of talking & listening, make reading & writing a priority and be consistent.
